Dear Parents and Guardians,

On behalf of the WOHS Student Services Team, I would like to welcome you to the Warrior Family! In the 2017-2018 school year, WOHS is serving over 2,900 students. We are very proud of the accomplishments of our students in the 2016-2017 school year. To name a few, at WOHS we:

- increased the number of industry certifications earned by 24% to 452.
- increased the number of students enrolled in at least one AP class by 9% to 1518 students, while increasing proficiency (number of students scoring a 3, 4, or 5 on the AP exam), by 2%.
- had our seniors awarded \$1,650,720 in Bright Futures scholarship dollars.
- had our seniors earn over \$4,493,406 in total scholarship dollars, an increase of \$555,206 or 12% from the Class of 2016.
- had a 3% increase in our Algebra 1 performance.
- had a 21% increase in our Algebra 2 performance.
- had a 3% increase in the performance of our lowest 25% of students on the FSA ELA (this shows that we are reaching struggling students).

At WOHS, we are committed to developing well-rounded students through providing opportunities to participate in rigorous coursework, including over 20 different AP courses, a plethora of Dual Enrollment course opportunities, and numerous CTE (Career-Technical Education) options. In addition to advanced coursework, WOHS offers over 54 extracurricular activities, and over 25 different sports teams, as well as numerous campus-wide events held throughout the school year. We encourage your student, and you, to get involved in the various programs throughout the school. We also have a very supportive and involved PTSO and SAC committees, both of which welcome and encourage new parents to join (see contact and membership information for these organizations in our welcome packet).

Our Student Services Team, which includes our 8 school counselors, staffing specialist, ESOL compliance teacher, Orange Technical Education advisor, and College and Career Specialist, strives to help all students reach their academic, social, and personal goals. Attendance

OCPS Attendance Policy:

Absence- The parent has 48 hours to provide a note to excuse the absence. For three (3) or more days out of school, a doctor's note is required.

Truancy- five unexcused absences within a calendar month or 10 unexcused absences within a 90-day calendar month.

Prearrange Absences (Form)- is a way to inform teachers of your child's time out of school and to get assignments in advance for academic purposes. It does not excuse the absences as the time out of school must meet OCPS policy. Please know that family vacations are not excused absences.

Tardy- Parents must sign their students in when student arrive late to school. If a student is late to class during the day a detention will be given.

Community Service Volunteer Hours

Although it is not a requirement to graduate, community service hours are required for the Bright Futures Scholarship and are a positive addition to college applications. Updated state and district guidelines and criteria for students to complete community service hours are posted on our schools website. Students must complete a comprehensive community service plan which addresses a social problem or concern, and submit the plan to their guidance counselor for approval prior to implementation. Please see the link below for additional information, forms, and suggested projects.

Guidelines for students:

- 1. Obtain the required forms from the school website or your guidance counselor
- Develop a written community service plan which addresses a social problem or concern.

- 3. Submit the plan to your counselor for approval before you begin your community service.
- 4. All community service will begin the summer prior to entering high school. Community service prior to grade 9 will not be counted.
- 5. Submit community service documentation to your counselor upon completion of the approved activity.

^{*}Foreign Language is not required for graduation, but it is required for the Bright Futures Scholarship and admission into State Universities

*The following state assessments must be taken in order to meet state graduation guidelines:

- Reading (FSA)- score of 3 or higher (or concordant SAT or ACT score)
- Algebra 1- passing score or concordant PERT score
- Geometry- must take assessment and earn a passing grade for the class
- US History- must take assessment and earn a passing grade for the class
- Biology- must take assessment and earn a passing grade for the class

Scholar, Merit, Biliteracy Designations

In addition to meeting all Standard Diploma Requirements, students completing the following requirements will qualify for the Scholar or Merit Designations to be added to their diplomas:

Scholar Designation:

- 1 credit in Algebra 2
- 1 credit in Statistics or equally rigorous math course
- 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to chemistry or physics
- 2 credits in the same world language
- 1 credit in AP, IB, AICE, or a dual enrollment course
- Pass the Biology, US History, Algebra 2, and Geometry EOCs

Merit Requirements:

- 1 credit in Algebra 2
- 1 credit in Statistics or equally rigorous math course
- 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to chemistry or physics
- 2 credits in the same world language
- 1 credit in AP, IB, AICE, or a dual enrollment course
- Pass the Biology, US History, Algebra II (juniors only), and Geometry

EOCs

- In addition to meeting all Standard Diploma Requirements:
 - Attain one or more Industry Certifications

^{**} Students in AP level classes do not typically take the EOC, you <u>WILL</u> need to take, and pass, the State EOC in order to qualify for the Scholars diploma.

Florida Seal of Biliteracy:

The Florida Seal of Biliteracy Program is established to recognize a high school graduate who has attained a high level of competency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more foreign languages in addition to English by the award of a silver or gold seal on a standard high school diploma.

Criteria for Eligibility. Beginning with the 2016-2017 school year, the Gold Seal of Biliteracy or the Silver Seal of Biliteracy shall be awarded to a high school student who has earned a standard high school diploma and who has satisfied one of the following criteria for eligibility:

- (a) Silver Seal of Biliteracy.
- 1. Has earned four (4) foreign language course credits in the same foreign language with a cumulative 3.0 grade point average or higher on a 4.0 scale;
- 2. Has earned a score or performance level on any of the examinations found on the chart shown below;
 - (b) Gold Seal of Biliteracy.
- 1. Has earned four (4) foreign language course credits in the same foreign language with a cumulative 3.0 grade point average or higher on a 4.0 scale and Level 4 or higher on the Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) Florida Standards Assessment (FSA);
- 2. Has earned a score or performance level on any of the examinations identified by the State of Florida.
- *Qualifying exams and scores can be found on the WOHS Guidance Website.

Important Testing Related Graduation Requirements

Algebra 1 EOC Graduation Requirement:

- All students must complete and receive a passing score on the Algebra 1 EOC.
- All students must sit for the Algebra 1 EOC at least once in order to use a concordant score.

 Students may take the PERT (after they've taken the Algebra 1 EOC at least once) in order to attempt to receive a concordant score. Students must score at least a 97 on the PERT to receive credit for the Algebra 1 EOC.

FSA ELA Reading and Writing Graduation Requirement:

- All students must take and receive a passing score (Level 3) on the 10th grade
 FSA ELA Reading and Writing tests.
- Students must sit for the 10th Grade FSA ELA Reading and Writing tests at least once in order to use a concordant score.
- Students may take the SAT or the ACT to get a concordant score. For the SAT, a student must have a 430 on the Reading/Writing portion or a 24 on the Reading section. For the ACT, a student must achieve a 19 on the Reading portion of the test.

End Of Course Exams:

The following courses have State required End of Course (EOC'S) Exams:

All EOC's count as 30% of the final grade for the course.

- Algebra 1 Graduation requirement
- Algebra 2
- Geometry
- Biology
- US History

Common Final Exams:

The following semester —long classes have a common final exam that will count as 20% of their final grade in the course:

First Aid & Safety, PEER Counseling, Weight Training, Individual & Dual Sports, Team Sports, Critical Thinking and Study Skills, Career Research and Decision Making, Economics, US Government, Psychology, Sociology, Holocaust, AgriScience, most all Business classes, and Technology classes.

In addition, there are many year-long courses that also require a Common Final Exam in the spring. This exam will count as 20% of the final grade for the course. These courses include any class that does not have a State-generated End of Course exam. If you are unsure whether your class has a Common Final Exam, you should check with your teacher to verify.
